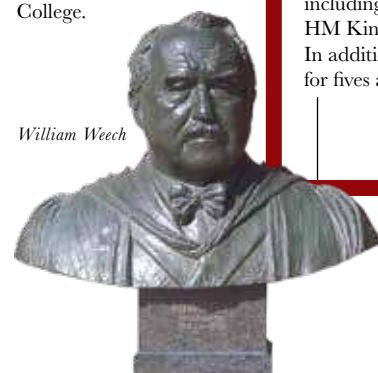

Frederick Malim BA, MA (Cantab)
1907-1911
Malim encouraged science and fell walking. He also wrote the words of the School song 'Winder'. During his time work began on Malim Lodge (the Bursary). He left to become Headmaster of Haileybury and later of Wellington College.



William Weech



Charles Lowry MA (Cantab)
1900-1907
Lowry oversaw a growth in staff and pupil numbers, leaving in 1907 to take up the post of Headmaster at Tonbridge.
1901 – The CCF was formed and Armoury built.
1906 – Powell Hall was built.



William Weech MA (Oxon)
1912-1926

Came to Sedbergh from Cheltenham College where he was an assistant master. During his Headmastership the numbers in the School reached 400
1913 – Knowles Pavilion was built
1916 – Powell House was converted from the Masters' Hostel
1921 – The first chemistry labs were built
1924 – The War Memorial Cloisters were completed
1926 – Winder House was completed
Further building took place during Weech's tenure including the King's Steps, to commemorate the visit by HM King George V and Queen Mary in 1917. In addition playing fields plus courts for fives and tennis were created.



G. B. Smith MA (Cantab)
1927-1936

Smith, a fine historian who encouraged art and music, came to Sedbergh from Repton. Although he served at a time of recession he oversaw the building of Busk Pavilion, the Memorial Lodge and gates, the Sanatorium and the first squash courts. He retired due to ill-health

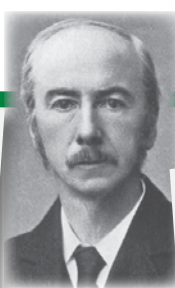
Henry Blomeyr
1525-1543
Blomeyr was the Chaplain under whom a few scholars were gathered from 1525, the accepted date on which Roger Lupton, Provost of Eton College, began to provide for a Chantry School in Sedbergh. In his will Blomeyr left six silver spoons to his successor and some books for the use of the School.



The ceremonial trowel used for the laying of the foundation stone of the new chapel

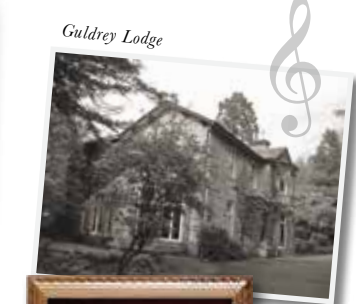
Henry George Hart BA, MA (Cantab)
1880-1900

Hart, an Old Rugbeian, was the first lay Headmaster and founded the modern Sedbergh, its institutions and traditions. During his tenure:
1885 – Lupton House was acquired
1890 – Hart House was completed
1893 – The Masters' Hostel was built
1896 – The staff helped form Sedbergh Golf Club
1897 – The new Chapel was built
1897-8 – the OS Club was founded



Frederick Heppenstall BA, MA (Cantab)
1875-1879

Former Headmaster of the Perse School, Cambridge, Heppenstall was a man of immense energy and foresight who raised the numbers to 56 in five terms. During his time the Governors requested plans for a Headmaster's House with boarding accommodation, four other master's Houses, also to accommodate boarders, classrooms, a gymnasium, a swimming bath and a chapel. Some of this was completed by 1879 when Heppenstall died suddenly.

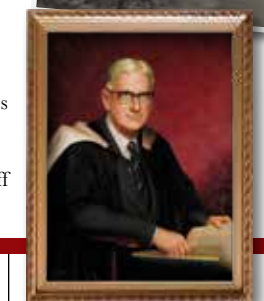


Guldrey Lodge



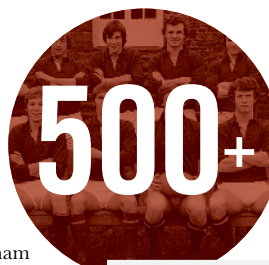
Peter Attenborough MA (Cantab)
1975-1981

Came to Sedbergh from Uppingham where he was a Housemaster. During his tenure Cressbrook House, the preparatory department, was established in the former Sanatorium and the Danson Room and new squash courts were built. Attenborough left to become Headmaster of Charterhouse.



Michael Thornely MA (Cantab)
1954-1975

A graduate from Cambridge in classics and modern languages. In Thornely's time science was given due recognition and the new science and mathematics block built. In addition, the design centre was constructed and swimming baths and boarding Houses modernised and enlarged. A record number of boys attended the School, music and drama flourished and Guldrey Lodge was acquired as a music school. All this was achieved despite staffing and other problems due to the war.



Roger Baxter B.Sc., Ph.D.
1981-1995

Baxter came to Sedbergh from Winchester and oversaw an ambitious programme of refurbishment and building including the sports hall, Queen's hall, boarding Houses and classrooms. In 1989 numbers rose above 500 for the first time in the School's history.

Christopher Hirst MA (Cantab)
1995-2010

A history graduate from Cambridge, Hirst became a Housemaster at Radley in 1978. He was then appointed Headmaster of Kelly College before moving to Sedbergh. During his tenure, Sedbergh School became co-educational with Lupton House reopening as a girls House and Cressbrook becoming Robertson, a second girls House. Sedbergh Junior School was formed in 2002, operating firstly at Sedbergh, then from the former Bentham Grammar School and finally from Sedbergh in 2009.



Sara Hirst
SJS Headmistress 2008-2010
Sara Hirst became Head of SJS when the School moved from Bentham back to Sedbergh until her retirement in 2010.



Paul Reynolds
SJS Headmaster 2002-2008
Reynolds was Sedgwick Housemaster 1996-2000 then Cressbrook Housemaster 2000-2002. He established SJS at Bentham and was Headmaster there from 2002 to 2008.

Andrew Fleck BSc (Nottingham), MA (Sussex)
Principal 2018-2021
Prior to joining Sedbergh Fleck was Headmaster of Ashville College, Harrogate. Previously he was Deputy Headmaster of St Bede's School, East Sussex, and Head of Geography and a Housemaster at Hurstpierpoint College, West Sussex. He read Geology at Nottingham University and gained an MA from Sussex University. In 2018 he became Principal of Sedbergh School, CSPS and Rong Qiao China.



Will Newman

CSPS Headmaster 2017- present
Newman joined CSPS from Taunton Prep School where he was Deputy Headmaster for 3 years. He is also a compliance inspector for the Independent Schools Inspectorate. He has taught Science and English and has a first class degree in Education from Exeter University. He gained an MA in Physical Education from the University of Victoria in Canada.



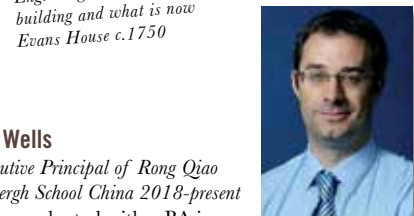
Dan Harrison MA (Cantab)

Headmaster of the Senior School 2018-2021
Headmaster of Sedbergh 2021-present
Dan joined Sedbergh straight from Cambridge in 1993. He taught Chemistry and was Director of Rugby for 11 years. He was appointed Second Master in 2015 and Headmaster of the Senior School in 2018. In 2021 he became Headmaster of Sedbergh with responsibility for the Senior and Prep Schools and Rong Qiao Sedbergh School, China.



CASTERTON SEDBERGH PREPARATORY SCHOOL
Scott Carnochan
2010-2017
SJS and CSPS Headmaster

Carnochan was Headmaster of SJS and then became Headmaster of Casterton Sedbergh Preparatory School in 2013. Previously he had been Head of Boarding at Foremarke Hall and Housemaster at St John's College Prep School, Cambridge. He was educated at Dollar Academy and gained a BEd from Heriot Watt University.



Oily Wells
Executive Principal of Rong Qiao Sedbergh School China 2018-present
Wells graduated with a BA in Business Studies from the University of Sheffield. He gained a PGCE(ICT) and an MA in Education Management from King's College London. Appointed in 2018 to be the Principal at the new Rong Qiao Sedbergh School China after previously being the founding Headteacher of Oxford International College, Changzhou.



Engraving showing the school building and what is now Evans House c.1750

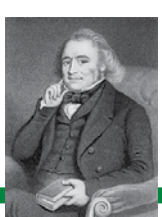


William Broxholme A, MA, BD (Cantab)
1742-1746

Previously Master of Hawkshead Grammar School, only six boys went to University in his time. Broxholme was considered to have neglected his duties and died after 4 years in office.

William Stevens BA, MA (Cantab)
1799-1819

A former Chaplain in the Royal Navy Stevens inherited only a few pupils. Although he succeeded in building up the numbers for some years the School was finally reduced to 8 day boys and no boarders.



John Harrison Evans BA, MA (Cantab)
1838-1861

In his time 480 boys entered the School, the standard of scholarship increased substantially and the prestige of the School was restored.



Richard Garthwayte BA, MA (Cantab)
(OS) 1646-1648

Went on to be Master of Kirkby Lonsdale School and later of Newcastle-upon-Tyne Grammar School.

Gilbert Nelson BA, MA (Cantab)
1623-1646

Won praise from the famous Dr Peter Barwick for his teaching methods.

The Iconography and Platform of Sedbergh School engraved by Johannes Kip c.1710

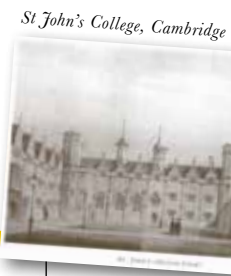


1874

This was a significant year for the School as control was taken from St John's College, provision was made for external examinations and regulations were drawn up for the keeping of 'Trust accounts'. The Governing body was widened and it's first meeting took place at the Bull Inn, Sedbergh on 10th December.

Robert Heblethwaite BA, MA (Cantab)
(OS) 1544-1570

In 1527 the School had been bound to St John's College, Cambridge through the foundation deed which decreed that St John's was to appoint the School's Headmasters. Heblethwaite was the first Headmaster to be chosen by St John's. The School was re-established and re-endowed in 1551 as a Grammar School with St John's retaining the right to appoint the Headmasters who were always clergymen and often pluralists.

Edward Fell BA, MA (Cantab)
(OS) 1662-1674

Fell did much to revive the fortunes of the School, sending 81 boys to Cambridge. He left £5 in his will, the interest from which was dedicated to the purchase of dictionaries for use by the School.



Thomas Dwyer BA, MA, BD (Cantab)

1706-1709
Formerly Headmaster of Pocklington and Leeds Grammar Schools, during his three years of office only 12 boys joined Sedbergh. He retired to become Rector of Medbourne in Leicestershire.

Samuel Saunders BA, MA, DD (Cantab)
1709-1741

The son-in-law of Wharton, Saunders was able to sustain the pupil cohort. The School owes to him the present Library, built in 1716 as the new School House. During his time the Lady Betty Hastings Scholarships were established.
